Yours of the 11th just received and I am glad that any suggestion I could make is acceptable. The point I made is clearly shown in Figures 26-27 of second edition. I should have said also that this curvature is more angular on the mesial side. Would not outlines of surfaces in some cases help to fix the various grooves, as for instance, an outline of the occluding surface of the lower first permanent molar? They might be called "working diagrams." I find such in teaching helpful. The addition of a glossary was an excellent thought. Wish it could be larger, and also that the pronunciation of such words as "alveolar," "apical," and others be made clear. An illustrated appendix of anomalous forms of crown roots, I think would add to value of book. I cannot add anything now to the recommendation. It seems to me your work in that direction is perfect, so far, and I sincerely hope that definite action be taken in your



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report at the Congress, and that the profession will adopt it. If I can see of any Service will gladly do what I can. It is my intention to present a paper at the Congress if I can complete it. So far I have been hindered from working upon it much.

I enclose you my list of examination questions for this year.
