Have been reading the circulars you sent out to your Committee relating to worse to be done at the Columbian Meeting. The more I think about the matter the more I know I better not say much. I think this however so - The dental profession as a rule are very fond of being scholars and will concur to be for some time. This itself will prevent any radical change in the language - whatever might be the advantage. I think suggestions as to the words now used and recommended and the manner of making new words when necessary will be about the limit

students to gradually improve the

"Cocoonine" a fourth of this and a fifth
of that and all prominent men what
are you going to do - but suggest & recom-
